to this year's theme, "Picture This!" It made me wonder, as we look forward to 2020 and beyond, how do we picture our Hillyard community? Who do we want to be? How can we set up our children for success?

To build that future, we must take action.

As the promised expansion of the North Corridor finally winds its way into the neighborhood, we can expect the landscape of Hillyard to change. On the verge of a major revitalization, property values soared 10% over the past year, now averaging \$151,400. This is up from \$86,300 just four years ago.

The NE corner of town has seen the addition of several new businesses, including a flashy storage unit, a produce market, construction contractors and a yummy taco food truck. According to city permit records, more gas stations, convenience stores and storage units

are coming. Planning is also underway for a 22-acre industrial park west of Esmeralda Golf Course, which may generate thousands of jobs. Affordable apartments and duplexes to house homeless youth and veterans are going up near Arlington Elementary School.

Amid the shiny new buildings, Hillyard is hanging tight to its distinct identity as a rail town. You can still stroll down Market St. to pop into quaint antique shops and proper dive bars. Where outsiders may see decaying structures, local artists see perfect canvases for street murals. Instead of throwing away our history, residents are resourcefully repurposing old schools, libraries and factories into clever business ideas.

In this year's Hillyard Gazette, you'll find stories about neighbors who are nurturing pockets of community. You'll meet local business owners, including Jeff and Anah, who are the fourth generation to keep the doors open at Mr. Ken's Babershop. You'll learn how local Allstate agent and lifelong Hillyard renegade, Paul Hamilton, is scooping up and preserving artifacts. You'll discover meaningful ways to get involved in the community, such as sharing your vision for Hillyard with the Zone Project on July 12 at the NECC.

Whether you still live in the neighborhood or just stop by now and again, the Hillyard

Festival gives you a chance to reconnect with this beautiful community. I hope you will find, like I have, that Hillyard will always be home.

2 Bits: A Shave and Haircut

For a long time, in the heart of Hillyard, history has been passed down from man to man. You will find an old-fashioned place with fish on the walls, where the coffee is always hot and the bull is always deep. Even in a modern world, the chair is where to find out the word on the street.

A long-standing tradition of fellowship and bad jokes has been happening in Hillyard since 1903 when the barbering building was built at 5022 N. Market. Art Gris, an immigrant from Italy, first opened Gris. With a fireplace in the back and posters supporting our troops hanging on the wall, a precedent was set. It quickly became a place for getting a straight flat-top and straight talk. After fighting in WWII, Harvey Schluter came home to Spokane and fell deeply in love with his wife, Irma. Married for over 75 years, the Schluters helped more than 120 children by showing them the value of good, clean living.

Next, it became Mr. Ken's Barbershop. Ken Lundy was encouraged by his wife, Heather, to come to our neighborhood in 1985 to carry on the tradition of showing the next generation what it means to be a good man. Jeff Longhofer and Anah Clark continue to carry the torch of keeping the traditional barbershop atmosphere.

It's a Beautiful Day in the Neighborhood

Mailman Dan stops by the barbershop to bring the mail, pet Spokie and Sally, or get his son's hair cut. Uncle Terry pops in to eat lunch (in front of us!) and talk about cars



and pick up the news going around. This is a place where you know a guy who knows a guy. You need a tow? Let me call Bulldog Towing for you. Want an oil change while getting a haircut? Hold on, we'll check with Howes Auto Service down the street. Need to eat? Greene's Produce will hook you up with the tastiest sandwich. Just tell them Anah and Jeff sent ya!

We want you to come in and have a hometown experience, so we always have coffee and a snack. Check out the "Cookie

Cop" for a treat if you are good during your haircut. If you were lucky enough, then you might have glimpsed zombies milling around the shop while Spokane's "Z-Nation" was filming. Season 4's episode 10 also features the Benson house, which is owned by our local Allstate agent, Paul Hamilton.

Leading by example in our community, we support the Historic Hillyard Rail Society and the Rogers High School ROTC, drama department and cheerleading squad. We also reach out to the citywide community through the Shriners and several other local charities to support our local schools and all our patriots serving in the military.

The barbershop has been offering traditional barbering services for 116 years. We are proud to carry on this incredible lineage by continuing to offer traditional services and traditional prices. While a shave and a haircut (\$27) may now cost more than the original 2 bits, we have kept the barbershop "like it was" by only taking cash and having barbering days from Tuesday through Saturday. If you only have half your hair, then we'll charge you a finder's fee! If you have ever "stayed late," then you know what a barbershop is supposed to be.





How Hillyard Got Its Name

Hillyard is named after its founder, James Jerome Hill (September 16, 1838-May 29, 1916), who was a noted Canadian-American railroad executive. He was the chief executive officer for the Great Northern Railway, which covered the Upper Midwest, Northern Great Plains and Pacific Northwest.

Jim moved to the United States at the age of 18 and settled in St. Paul, Minnesota. By 1860, he handled freight transfers and dealings with the railroad and steamboats. During the panic of 1873, a number of railroads had gone bankrupt. Jim saw this as a

golden opportunity to fix the problem and make a good deal of money. After three years of research, he teamed up with some businessmen to buy the railroad and the bargaining trackage rights to the Pacific Railway.

Special thank you to Anah and Jeff of Ken's Barbershop for sharing this story about the legacy of Hillyard's founder, Jim Hill, and these photos of the Madren Bros Studebaker dealership.

He wanted people to settle along his rail lines, so he sold homesteads to immigrants and then imported them to their new homes on his rail lines. He also sold wood and imported grains from Russia to local farmers and encouraged them to buy his wheat. His 1880 net worth of \$728,000 grew to \$25 million in just five years.

Since the federal government would force lowering the railway tariff rates if the railroads made too much profit, Jim avoided this by investing a large portion of his profits back into the railroad. Between 1883 and 1889, he expanded his railroads across Minnesota, into Wisconsin and through North Dakota into Montana. When there was not enough industry in the areas surrounding the railroad lines, Jim would buy out a company and build plants along the railroad lines. In 1889, his line became connected to the First Transcontinental Railroad.

Jim wanted the best possible line with the shortest distance, lowest grades and least curvature. He avoided the scenery of the Rocky Mountains because of the expense to develop it. By 1893, Jim had completed his dream of building the Great Northern Railway to run from St. Paul to Seattle, a distance stretching more than 1,700 miles. The Great Northern Railway was the first transcontinental built











Saving Hillyard One Piece at a Time

Architectural salvage has become a big business in America. Thirty years ago, I was paid to demolish the blacksmith shop that sat at the Western Fruit Yards behind the U.R.M warehouse. This building was 35 feet wide, 72 feet long and 28 feet high with four huge turrets on top. When I saw the shop, I thought it was way too nice to demolish, so I moved it to my father's (Leonard Hamilton) backyard. He still uses it today.



It is funny how things work out. In 2011, I purchased the original Blacksmith Shop in Historic Hillyard at 3110 E Olympic Ave. I have made a new sign for it and restored it. Currently for rent, it has 1,800 square feet and 14-feet ceilings.



After 10 years of hard work by many neighbors and myself to place Hillyard on the Historic Registry, I purchased the oldest building in Hillyard, The Benson Boarding House, at 3112 E Olympic Ave. Built in 1892, it originally sat directly across the street from the Hillyard Train Station. Despite its age, it still has great bones with beautiful rough-cut lumber and the original roof, which has never leaked.

Still, it needs a new foundation and lots of money to remodel it to make it habitable. My dog, Josie, lives there now and keeps the house - and my Ferris Wheel - safe.

In 1979, the Hillyard Train Station was cut in half and hauled out to Trent and Sullivan. It was the Depot Restaurant for 20 years, but that building has sadly sat vacant since then. I have always pictured moving it back to Hillyard.

In 2018, I contacted the owners and inquired about it, but an inspection revealed that it would be impossible to move it and bring it up to the City of Spokane building codes. So, I did the next best thing and acquired the cupula to bring back to Hillyard. I am not sure what I am going to do with it, so I am looking for some of your ideas and suggestions.

Pirate Pride: Rogers Achieves Unprecedented Success

With a fighting spirit that would make the fiercest Pirate proud, Rogers High School has achieved something that many doubted could be done — reaching an 85 percent graduation rate.

The New York Time featured the impressive turnaround in a 2017 article, applauding the efforts of a diligent team of administrators, teachers and counselors. Graduating students get hands-on assistance mapping out future plans and submitting financial aid paperwork. This devoted attention has resulted in an incredible 94 percent application rate for post-graduation programs. Pathways include community colleges, universities, trade programs, apprenticeships and the military. Just four years ago, only half of the senior class continued their education. A decade ago, just 20 percent were college-bound.

Administrators operate from the belief that making high school harder is the key to preparing students for completing college, so unchallenging courses have been eliminated. Class schedules are now more rigorous, often including advanced placement and college prep courses. Funding is available to cover testing fees for the SAT and AP exams. Others enroll in Running Start to earn dual high school and college credits.

With higher standards for curriculum now in place, the skills students are picking up are serving them well beyond the high school classroom. These strategies are helping students stick with their education pathways, contributing to a dramatic jump in second year return rates, rising from 16 percent to 69 percent.

The road has been far from easy for both students and staff. Many have overcome extreme challenges, including failing grades, absent parents, foster families, addiction and homelessness. They dream of becoming nurses, social workers and engineers.

"It takes everybody, including the community, the kids, the parents," Principal Lori Wyborney, an EWU alumni who took over leadership of RHS in 2010, told the New York Times. "The harder classes don't just prepare students academically." She notes that students finally realize they actually are good students. They can visualize being in a college classroom. They find out that continuing their education is affordable.

The unprecedented successes are celebrated in a variety of ways. A \$1,000 grant funds incentives for applying to programs. A school wall display prominently congratulates applicants. On May 20, the RHS gym thundered with cheers as a winding line of seniors stepped to the mic to victoriously announce their choices on Senior Signing Day.

Principal Lori Wyborney commended the Class of 2019 at graduation for their passion and creative solutions for environmental issues, homelessness, safe schools, teacher layoffs, mental health and equal rights. She noted that this next generation gives her hope for the future.

With a new school year around the corner, don't expect administrators to sit back and enjoy their successes — even with the recent staff reductions. With a fierce gleam in their eyes, they are on a mission to fulfill the 100% College Application Completion Project.


The Field of Dreams: Northeast Community Center

The Northeast Community Center has a rich history of growth and contributions to the community. All centers in Spokane grew out of community development efforts, funded by federal Community Development Block Grants in the mid-1970s. A feasibility study by the City of Spokane noted that residents of East Central, West Central and Hillyard neighborhoods, in particular, had unmet social and human service needs that could be addressed by multipurpose community centers serving all age groups.

In 1978, the City Plan Commission partnered with the Hillyard, Nevada/Lidgerwood and Logan Neighborhood Steering Committees to create the Northeast/City Center Task Force. East Central Community Center opened, and West Central Community Center followed shortly after. Unfortunately, the City Council terminated the Northeast project work, fearing the budget impacts of operating a third center.

Northeast neighbors undertook a major lobbying effort, and in May 1979, the project was reauthorized to proceed with planning and programming. Two conditions were attached:

- 1) The neighborhood must show the need for a center in the area;
- 2) The center must be programmed to be self-supporting.







Self-sufficiency remains our heritage, our legacy and our operating philosophy.

In 1982, the center finally opened its doors with around 23,800 square feet of space. Since then, we have physically expanded three times and now stand just under 70,000 square feet, plus a community garden at the corner of Liberty and Lacey and all the surrounding grounds and parking lot. We now adjoin the Hillyard Library, which was newly constructed in 1994. Along with housing a Head Start program, we added a full-day childcare center operated by Spokane Community College Head Start. Unify Community Health occupies the 31,000square-foot facility expansion that opened in January 2011. This space also continues to grow with dental services and a pharmacy.

Now that we have completed the tenant improvements in the new addition's lower level, we look forward to accommodating community meetings, receptions and other event rentals to help generate operational revenue. We also completed two computer labs with a targeted focus on youth summer learning initiatives and an ongoing afterschool homework club.

It is not likely that we're done yet! As long as there are families who need some help becoming and remaining self-sufficient, we'll have work to do. As long as there is a need to build service delivery capacity and access to programs and services in the community, we'll have work to do.

There are currently a number of social issues today that need attention, including housing, education, mental health, food security and job development. We are excited to work with our community to find creative, viable and sustainable solutions to these pressing concerns.
