Saint Petersburg, Florida frequently satiates my appetite for fishing and this particular morning was to be no exception. The sun glared off the water and instantly illuminated our spirits and smiling faces. Early that morning, we had already caught all of the bait needed for the day and it was set to be a successful fishing adventure. On this trip, our lineup consisted of Capt. Florida Insider Fishing Report is an action packed TV show, featuring nine regional Captains that navigate the waters around Florida.


Accordingly, they give weekly updates of the fishing reports from throughout the state of

Pulling out of the marina, we were a happy crew. The contagious excitement could be felt throughout the docks, as other local captains joked that they wanted to be on the boat with us. We started off snook fishing on a low, incoming



tide. We were fishing live sardines along a nearby sandbar and looked for potholes on the bottom beneath the shallow water. Arriving at our first spot, we chummed a bit. Our live well was full with shimmering baitfish, so we had plenty to spare.

We were using the trolling motor on a very low speed, in order to be as stealthy as possible. It's imperative to approach snook very quietly in order not to scare them away. They can be very "spooky" in shallow inshore water. In reference to their anatomy, a snook's mouth is near the top of its head and they feed nicely on top water baits. Snook like good current movement when they're feeding, so they will lay "nose into the current" and wait for the baits to come to them. A snook's mouth is rough and they have gill rakers, so it's not uncommon for them to cut the line. In order to land a snook with a light leader, it's a good idea to use a circle hook.

After our first casts, our baits started twitching with anxiety almost instantaneously. This spot was filled with snook!



Delighted with our find, Brie and I wrangled in a few good ones and our morning was off to a good start! Much to our delight, our rod tips trembled with action and we also pulled up several nice trout. We were doing all catch and release; we let approximately fifteen fish go within the first twenty minutes of our trip. Overall, it was a fantastic spot to begin our fishing day.



The gentle ripples on the water flicked the sides of our boat and we took in the glorious surroundings. As the sun continued to rise, our excitement mounted and we knew our fishing day was just beginning to warm up. With two thirds of our slam completed for the day and as the tide came up, we decided to go for redfish. There was a soft breeze and we slowly glided over the grass flats in search of reds. The skyline was gorgeous and it was a beautiful day. Soaring birds and leaping mullet surrounded us and there wasn't a cloud in the sky. The Florida sunshine kissed our cheeks and the view around us was spectacular. Suddenly, Capt. Jeff exclaimed, "they're right in front of us!" There were silver flashes in the water as we could see the redfish rolling in the shallow water.

Tailing redfish are beautiful and it's a real treat to land on top of a school of them. After immediately casting, we waited in anticipation. Like an explosion in the water, reds began snapping up our bait! Suddenly, Brie and I found ourselves in the middle of a fish-fueled frenzy! After muscling in a bunch of great redfish, we had a little fun taking pictures with them in the water during the release.



Elated with the turnout of the day, Brie and I gave each other slimy high-fives! Fish scales were stuck to our skin and they glittered in the sunlight. We had achieved our inshore slam and it was an awe-some day!
